Revolutionizing Access



Bucknell is committed to ensuring that every student has the resources and support they need to be successful in their chosen field.


A gift from Trustee Kathy Vizas '79 and her



NEW FRONTIERS IN SCHOLARSHIP

- » The National Science Foundation awarded an institution-record seven Graduate Research Fellowship Program grants to Bucknell students, placing the University at the top of its official peer group.
- » Professors Darakhshan Mir, computer science; Vanessa Massaro, geography; and Nathan Ryan, mathematics, received a \$60,000 Google Award for Inclusion Research to consider questions concerning prison algorithms and the realities of incarcerated people.
- » Funded by a \$150,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, 14 faculty members are designing a new health humanities minor, drawing upon history, philosophy, culture and the social sciences to create a holistic understanding of health and medicine.

- » Senior Design is a signature capstone of the Bucknell engineering experience that empowers teams of senior engineers to tackle development challenges drawn from real-world questions. Sponsoring partnerships with companies, nonprofits or government entities have grown significantly in the past five years, providing students with authentic engineering experiences.
- 2023 marks 100 years since the first woman graduated from Bucknell's engineering program

Freeman College of Management

A vanguard of management education since its inception, the Freeman College of Management has rapidly ascended the ranks of top-rated business schools in the nation. Expanded educational offerings include a new major in business analytics, a new minor in real estate — built upon the enthusiastic support of alumni in the industry — and a reimagined finance and accounting curriculum.

AT HOME AND ABROAD

- » Launched in the 2020-21 academic year, the Freeman College's real estate minor reveals how targeted alumni and donor support can deliver innovative experiences and meet emerging student needs. The program provides students with authentic industry experiences as they learn from still-unfolding case studies and build relationships with Bucknell alumni in the field.
- » The Management in Dublin Summer Internship program debuted in summer 2022 as one of the University's largest study abroad initiatives. Over eight weeks, 30 students developed cultural competency through curricular programming and co-curricular events. The program's success encouraged the college's plans to expand international initiatives Management in Asia Pacific launches in spring 2023.

Ecosystems of Support

Bucknell's campus is evolving as a safe, inclusive community that values diverse perspectives.

Students come to Bucknell to benefit from the exceptional academic programming, but they also seek growth beyond the classroom. To continue offering a best-in-class living-learning community, Bucknell is taking action to align its facilities, programming and staffing to cultivate a culture of belonging.

A HOLISTIC APPROACH TO INCLUSIVITY

Diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) have long been among Bucknell's highest priorities. In our strategic plan, we commit to building and sustaining a diverse community in which all students, faculty and staff experience a sense of belonging supported by a foundation of inclusion, equity and access. A newly created leadership role — vice president for equity & inclusive excellence — will lead the new Office of Equity & Inclusive Excellence and ensure that Bucknell is a truly welcoming community in which to study, live, work and thrive. While previous DEI efforts have addressed the needs of employees and students separately, this office will centralize these functions in a holistic approach to better serve the Bucknell community.

GOING BEYOND FOR STUDENTS

Two new full-time counseling positions will meet increased need for student mental health care.

The Outdoor Education & Leadership program has expanded to serve over 800 unique students, offering more than 40 off-campus excursions, extending climbing wall and rental center hours and doubling available Bison Bikes rentals.

Chief Anthony Morgan is leading Public Safety to build stronger, more transparent relationships with the campus community.

Renovations have been completed in Fran's
House and Vedder Hall, a new modern
apartment-style complex and outdoor
recreation space will replace the Mods, and a
housing study has been conducted to inform
future campus development decisions.





Leading the Way, by Way of Bucknell

A Bucknell education prepares graduates to invent a brighter future.

There's the surgeon who performed the world's first transplant of a pig's heart into his human patient, the prosecutor who repatriates illegally acquired antiquities, the engineer who's transforming New York City's skyline, the executive who helps make media workplaces and content more inclusive. In every industry, in the U.S. and abroad, Bucknell graduates change things for the better.

Our students are eager to carve their own paths of innovation and discovery — and they know that Bucknell is preparing them well. From climate change to economic inequality, population growth to pandemics, the path ahead presents obstacles of a dizzying scale and complexity. But Bucknellians are tenacious in their fight for a brighter tomorrow, and we're eager for the future they will shape.





Tomorrow's leaders and innovators are found in Bucknell classrooms today. Through hands-on, project-based learning opportunities, Bucknell faculty — like Professor Sam Gutekunst, the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Assistant Professor of Data Science — help students connect the dots between what they learn in class and the world they inhabit, and put their knowledge to work in making that world better.

Impressed by the initiative **Thomas Smith '23** (left) and **Jake Luther '23** (right) showed in his classroom, Gutekunst invited both computer engineering majors to participate in a research project aimed at helping Bucknell's Registrar's Office improve class scheduling. "Jake and Thomas stood out for their incredible intellectual curiosity and potential, so I was elated to get them on a project," Gutekunst says.

"Every year the registrar has to figure out how many sections of each course to offer," Luther says. "They look at past years' enrollment to determine what they're going to offer in the upcoming academic year. But they have to do it before they get acceptances from students. They don't know how many incoming first-years there are going to be, and they don't know their intended majors."

Under Gutekunst's guidance, the pair applied machine learning and data analytics to enrollment numbers from the past 12 years. They designed methods that can more accurately predict course enrollment, and began to look at techniques to help the Registrar's Office in making other decisions (like when to schedule final exams).

"One of the coolest parts of data science at Bucknell is that it can empower students to work with institutional data and make a real impact on campus," says Gutekunst of the project. "Jake and Thomas were the proof-of-concept for this. They discovered interesting, actionable trends and found compelling stories in the data."

The experience did more than just sharpen Smith and Luther's data-science skills and help Bucknell. The students leveraged the research project to land internships — Luther with Deloitte and Smith with Lockheed Martin. Impressed by their work, both firms extended job offers to Smith and Luther for after they graduate in May.

Months before they will put on a cap and gown, Luther and Smith have confidence in their next steps. They recognize it's thanks to their Bucknell education — and Gutekunst's mentorship. "I have an excellent foundation," Luther says. "I wouldn't have that without Sam's interest in my success."

We are building a better undergraduate experience and opening new pathways to Bucknell through careful stewardship of the University's resources.



Breaking Down the Budget


In order to create a best-in-class environment for all Bucknellians, the finance team carefully balances expenditures and income, focusing on appropriately resourcing each facet of the University.



\$79 million was netted out of tuition for the reported net \$146 million in tuition and fees. With a growth of over \$25 million in new resources for financial aid over the last decade, the University continues its long-standing commitment to revolutionizing access through scholarship and aid thanks to extraordinary philanthropic support and strategic budget management.

TUITION, EXPENSES AND THE ENDOWMENT

Bucknell is dependent upon tuition as a source of revenue to meet its annual operating expenses, due in large part to the size of our endowment.

In the most basic sense, a smaller endowment generates less income, making the institution more reliant on tuition to pay its bills. Since tuition covers only part of the expense of educating students, income generated by the endowment helps the University offset the difference and keeps tuition from escalating. As the endowment continues to grow, so do the resources available to Bucknell to support the whole student experience.

Bucknell is acutely aware of the ever-growing need to support student access through financial aid. Of the \$75 million allocated to financial aid in the 2023 budget, an estimated \$17 million is from endowment income or designated Annual Fund gifts.

Improving financial aid offerings — and thereby increasing access — is a critically necessary next step for the University. Bucknell competes with some of the most prestigious higher education institutions in the country, many of which have already developed distinctive programs for affordability that provide access to all students without the need for loans — a challenging and future-defining endeavor.



Bucknell's endowment has nearly doubled over the last 10 years, growing from \$599 million to \$1.071 billion.

SOLAR ARRAY

A newly installed 1.76-peak-megawatt, on-campus solar array — built in partnership with Encore Renewable Energy under the leadership of Encore CEO **Chad Farrell '92** — will supply up to 7% of the University's electricity, moving Bucknell closer to achieving carbon neutrality by 2030. It also offers abundant opportunities for teaching and research.

NEW NATURAL PATHWAY

The President's Sustainability Council debuted the 4-mile Bucknell Greenway in fall 2022. The multi-use path opens a new avenue for fitness, transportation, safety and connection with nature.

LIVING LABORATORY


Last year, in addition to its own programs, the Bucknell Farm partnered with more than 50 courses from all three colleges as well as three Residential Colleges, resulting in nearly 25% of Bucknell students having an on-site, hands-on experience at the farm.

HYPER-LOCAL DINING

Something new is sprouting in Bostwick and the Bison. Employing indoor Babylon Micro-Farms that use 96% less water and 55% less plastic than traditional farming, Bucknell Dining Services served up leaf lettuce, romaine, fresh mint and more — all grown right in the kitchen.

LEED GOLD FOR HOLMES HALL

Bucknell's newest academic building, Holmes Hall, achieved LEED Gold Certification from the U.S. Green Building Council. Like all recently constructed buildings at Bucknell, Holmes was built to meet stringent environmental guidelines and to remain sustainable for decades to come.





President John C. Bravman will continue leading Bucknell and the fulfillment of the University's strategic plan.

On Oct. 21, 2022, the Bucknell University Board of Trustees unanimously voted to extend President John C. Bravman's contract through at least 2028. Already among the longest-serving presidents currently leading American universities, Bravman will, by the end of his current contract, have held the third-longest tenure among all Bucknell presidents. Through periods of uncertainty and opportunity, Bravman's leadership has kept Bucknell focused on its mission and the fulfillment of its long- and short-term strategic goals.

High points of Bravman's presidency include the passage of the *The Plan for Bucknell 2025*, the University's first strategic plan in 13 years; his leadership of the successful efforts to remain open and ensure the continued delivery of in-person instruction during the COVID-19 pandemic; the establishment of the Freeman College of Management as Bucknell's third college in 2017; the construction of new academic and residential facilities that have transformed the campus and the student living-learning experience; and the completion of Bucknell's most ambitious fundraising campaign to date, the \$500 million WE DO Campaign.

Bravman's leadership offers a clear, bright and exciting vision for the Bucknell of tomorrow — one that will undoubtedly elevate and further strengthen the University's well-established position among leaders in higher education.
