

MAINTAINING GLOBAL MEDIA MOMENTUM

Bucknell's media presence surged forward in 2024–25, powered by a strategic communications framework designed to amplify faculty research, academic excellence, innovation and student success. This approach ensures that Bucknell's earned media placements spotlight important institutional priorities while also capturing the public imagination.

The University appeared in more than 13,000 news stories, with social echo (a measure of content resonance through sharing and engagement) exceeding 31,000 mentions* in fiscal year 2025. Bucknell's editorial reach grew by over 16% to nearly 30 billion potential views, spanning all 50 states and 57 countries. The value of this coverage also rose sharply, with annual ad-value equivalency climbing from \$240 million to \$280 million** — a testament to the growing visibility and influence of Bucknell's brand.

Bucknell's media relations strategy selectively targets top media outlets to maximize the impact of the most promising story pitches. In the past year alone, stories showcasing the work of Bucknell scholars

and students appeared in *The New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal*, *USA Today*, ABC News, CNN, NPR, *National Geographic*, and other national and global outlets, positioning Bucknell as a trusted and authoritative voice in national discussions on research, academia and higher education.

The Presidents Dinner

Now in its eighth year, The Presidents Dinner remains a marquee event in higher education journalism. Hosted by Bucknell and President John C. Bravman at the National Press Club in Washington, D.C., on Sept. 4, 2025, the evening brought together 11 college presidents and nearly 30 journalists for an open, on-the-record conversation about the future of higher education. This annual gathering continues to position Bucknell as a facilitator of national dialogue — reinforcing its role at the intersection of leadership, policy and public discourse in higher education.



U.S.-CHINA RELATIONS

Professor Zhiqun Zhu, political science and international relations, continues to be recognized as one of the world's leading scholars on Chinese foreign policy. National and international media frequently cite his analysis of U.S.-China relations and Asian affairs.

Last year, Zhu provided commentary on Chinese policy around the globe for stories by The New York Times, CNN, The Associated Press, Newsweek, Bloomberg News, South China Morning Post and Voice of America, among others. During the U.S. presidential election, his perspective on how the candidates might be viewed in China was frequently sought by media, including NPR and Fox News.

Professor **Matías Vernengo**, economics, director of the Bucknell Institute for Public Policy, offers media insight on the state of the economy in the U.S. as well as South America. The former senior manager of economic research at the Central Bank of Argentina, Vernengo has become a go-to expert for analysis of national and global macroeconomic trends, especially inflation.

Beginning in early 2025, ABC News and *U.S. News & World Report* regularly turned to Vernengo to gauge the impact of President Trump's tariffs on the U.S. economy. Other national outlets have tapped him for assessments of American consumer confidence and the national debt, and he has continued to lend his expertise on the state of the economy in his native Argentina.
